Reading Questions for March 16

These questions cover an article titled "Emotion" by Peter Goldie. The answers do not have to be turned in. You will probably have to read more than once to get the answers.

- 4. (*) In the subsection "Perceptual theories" (935-6), Goldie introduces these theories and notes some advantages and disadvantages of them. What are these theories and what does he say are their advantages and disadvantages? Do you think this type of theory is plausible? Why?
